I guess I don't often have the submerged in reality feeling while reading that I get when playing a really good game. Very few authors make me dream their stories, and not all of their books can do it. I have to feel that I'm experiencing the story, not just reading it. Daughter is the first book I've read in a couple years to do that for me. Thank you.

After reading Daughter, Legacy & Code, I can't see how anyone could miss the blatant similarities between your books and Code. It's a meld of elements from both your works, but, in this case, the total is less than the parts. I've heard that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery - unless you're a writer!! I am very impressed with your books. I will be looking for Slatewiper. I can't wait. You have earned a place in my library as well as my recommendations to all my friends.

I've been reading Dan Brown steadily since he released _Angels & Demons_, and read his entire backlist before diving into _Da Vinci Code_ a few months ago.

My husband read it first, and then passed it over to me. (He rarely gets to read a book first.) We were laying in bed, both reading, and he asked me what I thought. I was puzzled and said "I think I've read this before...."

Basically, the books were enough similar that ten years after having read your book, I felt "deja vu" reading Brown's book.

I've now read 4 books, reading Brown's Da Vinci Code last. (Also DVL, DoG, Angels & Demons)

When I finally read DVC, I found myself folding back pages where similarities seemed to jump out.

I've got a lot of dog-eared pages in DVC!

I mentioned the infringement to a friend who was into Brown's DVC & A&Demons. She then read DVL and DoG and commented "how could Brown get away with this!"

I still haven't read The Linz Testament. Not in local libraries or bookstores. Maybe I can get it from Amazon.com. That one is obviously important as it significantly precedes Brown's books.

I've finally gone back and read John's summary analysis-amazing how you managed to pull together strands to compare them. Even as I read the books, I was wondering how one would go about organizing a comparison of the content. A lot of work!!

And there is the similarity in the use of CERN and an anti-matter weapon of catastrophic power. Not in John's summary, but John's caveat notes that the summary only contains a sampling of the similarities.

Is Angels and Demons being included in the comparisons. I didn't note it in the summary. I see Brown having pulled from the Perdue books and put parts in DVC and parts in A&D, but I haven't really done a careful analysis. And at this point I'd have to go back and rethink it. Now they are becoming all blended together.

Where does one go from here!?! I don't have the time to do significant work to assist and I wouldn't

want to infringe on John's area of expertise. But if there were one small strand that you needed additional legwork on, I might be willing to help John out. Certainly one would need a scanner to do any more extensive detailed comparisons.
